From the Pastor's desk

Dear Christ Lutheran Church Family,

Grace and peace to you and from God the Father and our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Thanks to Him who sustained and brought us this far.

"If my people who are called by my name humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven and will forgive their sin and heal their land." 2 Chronicles 7:14

In this time of Lent I want you to focus on prayer as a means to draw near to our heavenly Father who sent his only begotten Son to save us from death. I just want to share this wonderful and powerful text with you as we humble ourselves before the Lord and continue to pray for us and for our church and the nation at large.

As Church-age believers we have the incredible privilege of access to the throne of grace for mercy to find help in time of need. Prayer for ourselves, our families, our leaders and nation; intercession for the lost is important – but it is also vital to understand the Bible in its correct historical context. And this verse is often quoted outside its true Biblical setting.

These were words spoken by the great King Solomon – the son of King David who built a magnificent Temple for the Lord. In the company of God's chosen people-Israel, he prayed that God would be faithful to keep the unconditional covenant that he made with his father, King David. God honored his prayer and accepted the sacrifices that King Solomon offered. The sign was that fire came down from heaven and consumed the offerings, and the glory of the Lord filled the Temple. As it is written, even the priests could not serve the usual service because of the glory revealed.

But Solomon had failed to reference the conditional covenant that God had made with Israel at Sinai through their great leader Moses, where blessings would result from Israel's obedience and faithfulness but curses would result from their disobedience. And so we read that in a night-time vision, God appeared to His servant Solomon and gave the king the following warning for Israel:

"I have heard your prayer and have chosen this place for myself as a house of sacrifice: when I shut up the heavens so that there is no rain, or command the locust to devour the land, or send pestilence among my people, and pray and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways, I will hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin and heal their land." 2 Chronicles 7:12-14

Our Confessional Lutheran Dogmatics

B) Holy Baptism

The Sacrament of Holy Baptism is the other Sacrament which we Lutherans emphasize as one of the important parts of our Christian doctrine. "According to Martin Luther's definition, Baptism is not just plain water, but it is the water included in God's command and combined with God's word." Holy Baptism is instituted by our Lord Jesus Christ as we read in the gospel of Matthew. "Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." (Matt 28:19). For Lutherans, baptism "works forgiveness of sins, rescues from death and the devil, and gives eternal salvation to all who believe this, as the words and promises of God declare." Baptism gives rebirth to be included in the kingdom of God.

Here is some biblical evidence of Baptism as a means of grace for our salvation: "Repent to be baptized, every one of you, in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins." Acts 2:38

"Get up, be baptized and wash your sins away." Acts 22:16

"Don't you know that all of us who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into His death?...if we have been united with Him like this in His death, we will certainly also be united with Him in His resurrection." Rom 6:3,5

"All of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ." Gal 1:13-14

"Whoever believes and is baptized will be saved." Mark 16:16

"This water (of Noah's flood) symbolizes baptism that now saves you also. It saves you by the resurrection of Jesus Christ." 1 Peter 3:23

He saved us through the washing of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit." Titus3:5

Infant baptism: Why do we Lutherans baptize infants?

- 1. According to what is written in the scripture, all nations should be baptized. The word 'nation' in English and the original Greek word in Greek New Testement, which is in the great commission of our Lord, includes infants. That is why Lutherans believe in infant baptism as biblical practice.
- 2. All have sinned and need salvation. Children are born with inherited sin according to what is written in the bible. Rom 3:23, 6:23, 5:12, Psa 51:5. The only way for infants to get forgiveness of sins is through baptism (Joh 3:5).
- 3. Infants were part of the Old covenant when God commanded Moses to do so.
- "You shall be circumcised in the flesh of your fore skin, and it shall be a sign of the covenant between me and you. He who is eight days old among you shall be circumcised. So shall my covenant be in your flesh an everlasting covenant." Genesis 17: 11-12

Baptism is the Christian equivalent of circumcision, or the circumcision of Christ: "In him you were also circumcised with...the circumcision of Christ, having been buried with him in baptism and raised with him through your faith in the power of God, who raised him from the dead" (Col. 2:11-12). Thus, like circumcision, baptism can be given to children as well as adults. The difference is that circumcision was powerless to save (Gal. 5:6. 6:15), but "(b)aptism...now saves you." (Pet.3:21)

Mode of Baptism

Jesus did not give us a clear mode of baptism in his great commission.

God also told Solomon that Israel's disobedience would result in loss of their peace, their freedom; their land and their Temple. Indeed, the Lord continued to explain to Solomon: "but if you turn aside and forsake my statutes and my commandments, and go and serve other gods and worship them, then I will uproot them from my land the land that I have given them. And this Temple which I consecrated for my name, will be cast out of my sight - and I will make it an object of scorn among all nations."

When the Word of God is not read in context it is easy to misunderstand its true meaning and purpose. Certainly, we should humble ourselves and pray. Indeed Christians are exhorted in the New Testament to: humble themselves before the mighty hand of God and to pray without ceasing. Certainly we should seek God's face and turn from our wicked ways in the power of the indwelling Holy Spirit as we die to self daily and live to God, for His praise and glory.

Certainly we should intercede for our world leaders, governments, nations and lost souls - indeed we are urged to make appeals to the Lord through prayers, petitions and thanksgivings, on behalf of all men - and Paul specifically mentioned kings and all who are in authority, so that we may lead peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and dignity - and certainly we should pray for the body of Christ, which is the Church - as well as for families and friends - yes, there are many instructions for Christians to pray and intercede.

This time should be a time of prayer for our church. Let us humble ourselves before his mighty hand. We have a number of homebound members who need our prayer and support. Therefore, I urge you all to join us on Wednesday evenings for the Lenten services at 7pm and for the 7pm Prayer Evening on March 27 at Christ Lutheran Church. I thank God for the unity of the Spirit we have, and we need to keep it going until the end!

Easter Vigil offers transition from sorrow to joy



The entire celebration of the Easter Vigil takes place at night. It should not begin before nightfall and end before daybreak on Sunday. The Church reads the account of creation as a prophecy when God said, "Let there be light." Readings will begin with Genesis and continue throughout the Bible to the final accounting of Christ's life, crucifixion, and resurrection in the Gospels.


The primary symbol is the Paschal Candle, the symbol of Christ Himself, risen triumphantly from the dead, shinning as the True Light to nations. We sing "The Light of Christ." His light breaks the darkness (leading people out of the darkness into light). The candles of the faithful are lit from the Paschal Candle, just as our baptismal candles are lit. Then the candles of the faithful followers are lit.

The service normally consists of four parts: The service of light where the Pascal candle is lit from fire significantly struck by stone (signifies the corner stone which is Jesus Christ). The second symbol is water or Baptism. Baptism is cleansing and new birth, making us the source of which Living Waters spring forth. The third symbol is the singing of the new song, The Alleluia. Singing with great joy. The fourth symbol is Communion - symbolizing the covenant of Christ's sacrifice by the body and the blood of Jesus as shared during the Last Supper for the forgiveness of our sins.
