From the Pastor's desk

Dear saints in Christ Lutheran Church.

Receive my warm greetings in Christ Jesus! We have continued to enjoy the blessings of the Lord in our Church. God blessed us with 14 new members last month and that was an unforgettable celebration. All of your feedback and appreciation together with your full support and prayers gives me the spiritual strength I need to proceed in my pastoral ministry!

As we approach the darkest and coldest months of winter, it is wonderful to see all the Christmas decorations with beautiful Christmas lights displayed almost everywhere. My first impression when going to Norway was the Christmas decorations. When I saw them, I said to myself 'Oh, these people are celebrating the birth of our Lord Jesus in a very special, different way compared to how they do it in Africa. Nevertheless, not long after that, I found out that the central figure in the Christmas celebration for the entire population of Norway was not Jesus. That is true for most of the European countries. The children in Norway are happier to hear about Santa Claus than Jesus because they have been brought up in a Christmas tradition where they hear almost nothing about Jesus. I think the United States is also affected in the same way.

In this time of Advent, which is a time of preparation, I want you to be aware and make the necessary preparations to come together as one body to celebrate the new born baby. Let him get our attention more than ever.

For many non-Christians and even members of churches of Christ, Christmas once meant decorated trees, colorfully wrapped gifts and Santa Clauses all around, but definitely no mention of baby Jesus. That is the worst crisis for the church of Christ. This worries me a lot. But how should we celebrate Christmas? This question is important because of the significance of the day and because so many obviously do not know how to celebrate it. That is the Christmas story - God became man! The infinite clothed in human flesh! How can this be? We cannot understand it – but it is true, and we should marvel at it. Allow it to stretch your mind and learn that there are more things in heaven and on earth that are dreamed of in any human philosophy.

The word Christmas or "Christ's Mass" was adopted in the fourth century by Roman Emperor Constantine to encourage a common religious festival for Christians and Pagans. It is all about Christ not anyone else. But nominal Christianity brought in wrong input and overshadowed the true and biblical celebration of Christmas.

Our Confessional Lutheran Dogmatics

Beginning with this month, Pastor will be writing a special column each month, discussing various elements of the Lutheran faith. He hopes to reach out to those who are unable to attend the Bible studies or unable to hear his sermons on Sunday.

The reformation of the 16th century brought several reforms to the Catholic Church which the church condemned. Those who protested the resistance of the church ended up in forming the Protestant movement, Luther was the dominant figure of the Reformation. I would like to point out some of the important Lutheran doctrines and the heritage of our church.

In this section I would like to focus on the differences between the Lutheran Church and the Roman Catholic Church. It is very important to make a clear distinction between the two. Otherwise, we end up ignoring the value of the Reformation.

Martin Luther was a Bible scholar and believed strongly that all doctrine must be solidly based on scripture. He rejected the idea that the teaching of the Pope carried the same weight as the Bible.

Initially, Luther sought only to reform the Roman Catholic Church, but Rome held the belief that the office of Pope had been established by Jesus Christ and that the Pope served as Christ's vicar or representative on earth. Therefore, the Catholic Church rejected any attempts to limit the role of the Pope or cardinals. Let me make some clear distinctions between Lutheran and Catholic Churches.

According to Lutherans, the Bible is the sole authority as far the doctrine of the church is concerned. Whereas, the Roman Catholics give doctrinal authority to the Pope, traditions of the church, and the scriptures.

The main point for Lutherans is that Justification comes to humans by grace alone, through faith in Jesus Christ alone; Roman Catholics believe that faith must be accompanied by good works for salvation to be achieved.

Lutherans believe that Christ is the head of the church and that the Pope or other ministers should not have divine authority over believers; whereas Roman Catholics believe Christ granted supreme authority to the Pope. For Lutherans, the Bible and the sacraments are the only means of grace. Lutherans have only two sacraments (Baptism and Holy Communion). On the contrary, the Roman Catholics have seven sacraments. The understanding of the sacraments in the Lutheran Church is different from that of the Roman Catholics.

Each Sunday, CLC members come to church expecting everything to be set for the worship service. The altar should be set: white linens and paraments cleaned and pressed, vases filled with flowers picked up Saturday morning at a local florist, altar candles filled with liquid wax, communion cups filled with wine, the ciborium filled with wafers, the altar carpet vacuumed, the communion railing disinfected, and the racks in the pews filled with envelopes, pencils, hymnals and Bibles.

None of this would be possible without the dedicated efforts of the Altar Guild members. Two teams alternate months of Saturday morning responsibilities. In addition, they prepare the altar for midweek services during Advent and Lent, plus weddings and funerals, and special events like Prayer Night and our weekend Revival.

Additional responsibilities continue after the services end each Sunday. Altar Guild members clear the altar, discard the plastic wine cups, wash the chalice, flagon (wine decanter), platen, communion cup trays, and transfer alter flowers to plastic containers so Evangelism volunteers can deliver them to our homebound or hospitalized members. They also remove the linens, wash and press them for the following week.

When our church membership started to decline years ago, the number of Alter Guild teams also declined. If anyone is looking for a way to serve the church and can devote a few Saturday morning hours every other month, please contact the church office or connect with any CLC member photographed above. If enough people volunteer, the rotation will be less often and the workload will be shared among more participants. Prayerfully consider joining this group of dedicated members whose work is greatly appreciated.
